
Whatcom County Primary Elections Turnout and Voting at Home 1936 – 2020



The state Legislature voted in 1985 to voters over the age of 65 and those with disabilities to request all ballots be mailed to their home. In 1993, the Legislature voted to allow registered voters to request all ballots be mailed to their home. By 2002, five rural counties were conducting all elections by mail. Whatcom County adopted voting-by-home in 2005. All public elections in the state are conducted by mailing ballots to homes.

Return Envelopes Challenged

Below are the reasons ballots were rejected and the number of rejections for the last five primary elections. The most common reason for rejection, by far, was an envelope with a late postmark. The statistics are from the Canvassing Board Reconciliation Report. The statistics represent the difference between envelopes received and ballots counted.


State/Local Election Statistics

Nine counties in the state had a higher primary election turnout than Whatcom County. They were Ferry at 68.93 percent, San Juan at 68.61 percent, Garfield at 67.78 percent, Jefferson at 67.48 percent, Columbia at 65.35 percent, Lincoln at 64.25 percent, Wahkiakum at 63.88 percent, Island at 62.89 percent and Pacific at 61.69 percent. The four counties in the state with the lowest turnout were Yakima at 44.23 percent, Franklin at 48.78 percent, Spokane at 49.72 percent and Adams at 50.83 percent.

Daily Envelope Count

The Whatcom County auditor's office mailed 150,515 primary election ballots to registered voters; 1,919 were undeliverable. Of the 92,780 envelopes counted, a little over half — 50,301 or 54.22 percent — of the envelopes were returned before election day. Total rejected ballots: 1,351 or 1.4 percent of the 94,131 envelopes returned.
