# Primary Election Results—2023

#### **Return Envelopes Challenged**

Below are the reasons ballots were rejected and the number of rejections for the last five primary elections. The most common reason for rejection, by far, was an envelope with a late postmark. The statistics are from the Canvassing Board Reconciliation Report. The statistics represent the difference between envelopes received and ballots counted.



The first column is the total number voting. The second column is the number voting on the candidate or ballot measure. The third column is the second column subtracted from the first column and reflected as a percent.





#### **Daily Envelope Returns**



The Whatcom County auditor's office mailed 159,755 ballots to registered voters: 2,007 were undeliverable. Almost two-thirds of the ballots — 37,452 or 64.83 percent — were returned before election day. Envelopes challenged accounted 1.11 percent of returned ballots.

#### **State/Local Election Statistics**

Of the 36 counties in the state with a primary, six had a higher election turnout than Whatcom County. They were Pacific at 51.27 percent, San Juan at 45.69 percent, Clallam at 38.24 percent, Okanogan at 37.81 percent, Benton at 37.51 and Klickitast at 36.85. The six counties had a total of 54,755 ballots cast. The five counties in the state with the lowest turnouts were Yakima at 19.27 percent, Clark at 19.39 percent, Grant at 20.60 percent, Pierce at 24.79 percent and Skagit at 24.92 percent.



# Whatcom County Primary Elections Turnout and Ballots Mailed to Homes: Percentages 1983 – 2023



The Whatcom County Home Rule Charter creating the office of Whatcom County executive and a seven-member County Council was approved by voters at the 1978 general election. A special primary to elect the executive and four council members was held on February 6, 1979, and a special general election was held on March 25, 1979. The three county commissioners were appointed to the other council positions. The first primary election ballot in which the Whatcom County executive and mayor of Bellingham appeared together was 1983.

Starting in 1915, Washington state voters were allowed to vote at home if they were unable to be present at a polling site on Election Day. In 1974, the Washington Legislature voted to allow voters to request a ballot be sent to their home for the next election without stating a particular need. Beginning in 1985, registered voters over the age of 65 and those with disabilities were eligible to receive all future ballots at their home. Starting in 1993, all registered voters could request all ballots be sent to their home. By 2002, five rural counties were mailing all ballots to voters homes. Whatcom County starting mailing ballots to all voters in 2005. All of Washington's 39 counties are now mailing ballots to voters.
